#### FIRE PREVENTION PROGRAM

#### FIRE FIGHTER SUPPORT PROGRAM

When those who protect and serve are in need, the Fire Fighters Foundation will be there. Fire fighters work in the heart of every community every day to keep those they serve safe. When Wisconsin's fire fighters are facing physical or mental health issues, personal tragedy or loss, or other challenges, it is our duty – and our honor – to help our brothers, sisters, families and communities in need. Fire fighter support programs include, but are not limited to: Disaster Assistance, Wisconsin State Fire Fighter's Memorial Support and Professional Fire Fighters of Wisconsin Honor Guard support.

#### Making an Impact Across Wisconsin

The Professional Fire Fighters of Wisconsin Charitable Foundation (PFFWCF) is working to create a fire-safe and burn-free Wisconsin through education, risk mitigation, and support of Burn Survivors, Fire Fighters, and Communities across Wisconsin. We accomplish our work through four



areas of programming: Burn Survivor Support; Fire Prevention and Safety; Fire Fighter Support; and Community Support.

We support Burn Survivors of all ages and in all stages of recovery. Whether it is providing burn prevention, awareness, and advocacy; supporting burn care in Wisconsin; supporting burn survivors through grants and scholarships; or through aftercare and support programming –like our Winter Leadership Retreat for Adult Burn Survivors, Summer Picnic, and Summer Camp for Burn Injured Youth that includes an Explorers camp for burn injured youth under the age of 7, Youth Camp (ages 7-12), Teen Camp (13-17) and Young Adult Leadership Program (YALP) for ages 18-21,we are there to support burn survivors. We continue our efforts towards a fire-safe and burn-free Wisconsin through our Fire Prevention and Safety Programming. Over 550,000 copies of our Fire Safety Newspapers in Education were distributed this fall across Wisconsin. Thank you to the schools, communities, and fire departments for utilizing this life saving program.

Through the Wisconsin Fire Sprinkler Coalition (WFSC) we are overcoming the barriers to fire sprinklers. The Wisconsin Smoke Alarm and Fire Education (WisSAFE) Coalition continues to educate communities and provide free smoke alarms to fire departments through a partnership with the American Red Cross. However, we can't do this alone. We know we can make a greater impact by those who utilize and practice Fire Safety in their community and at home. With that, we had our 29thAnnual Fire Safety Recognition Luncheon this fall to recognize those who are making that impact in their community.

We support fire fighters so they can better protect and serve their communities each day. Whether career or volunteer, we are there to support them in their time of need. We provide disaster assistance; work to improve fire fighter health, safety, and wellness; and honor the traditions of the job and those who made the ultimate sacrifice by assisting the Wisconsin State Firefighters Memorial and the Professional Fire Fighters of Wisconsin State Honor Guard.

We also support communities by reducing risk and enhancing the work fire fighters do both on and off duty. Thank you to those of you who continue to support our programs. It is because of people like you that add the fuel to our mission and vision. And it is because of you that we can continue to better serve Burn Survivors, Fire Fighters and Communities across Wisconsin.

## **PROGRAMMING HIGHLIGHTS**



#### The Young Adult Leadership Program (YALP) had another amazing year for 2019

YALP members started each day with physical activities including a BodyPump body weight circuit training instructed by Gina Euler and a Self Defense Class by Jeff Ponasik of 5 Element Fusion. Sherri Kayaks offered an instructional Paddle Boarding experience to promote new ways to incorporate healthy active lifestyles. This year's focus was to develop decision making, time management, team building, and interpersonal skills. These were explored with Jenny Crawford an HR specialist through a Budget Egg Drop experiment.

YALP members visited with the residents at Heritage Senior Living Center engaging with hand games, laughter yoga, and finger-painting projects. Walworth Co. provided QPR Suicide Prevention Training and guest speaker Sam The No Handed Bandit shared his story and helped debrief discussions regarding tough topics. YALP members attended a therapeutic riding workshop at SMILES INC working to improve communication skills, build self-esteem, and confidence in their outdoor horseback riding arena. Interactions with the youth campers included meal time conversation, movie night commodore, night watch, and low ropes course to help build leadership and maturity skills.

It's great to see the increasing numbers of returning YALPers and new members each year. Thank you for all the continued support to make this young adult burn survivor program happen, as it's critical for young adults to continue to have great support. I'm looking forward to seeing what YALP 2020 brings.

I came home a different person with a new outlook on the world as well as a new found confidence in myself and my scars! I strongly advise any survivor to attended this Conference. ## **Fire Sprinkler Saves**

## Fire Sprinklers Extinguish Deep Fryer Fire at Smith Bros. Coffee House

Oil in a deep fryer caught fire Monday morning at the Smith Bros. Coffee House in downtown Port Washington, activating fire sprinklers in the eatery. The coffee house is attached to a Duluth Trading Co. clothing store.

The Port Washington Fire Department responded in the early morning of October 21st. Upon arrival, fire crews saw that fire sprinklers extinguished the fire. Crews shut off the water to the sprinkler system and mopped up the water. Both businesses reopened later that week. No injuries were reported. A fire sprinkler contained a fire at an assisted living home on S. Brookline Drive in the City of Madison on October 14 shortly after 3 p.m. The sprinkler allowed on-site staff to deploy a fire extinguisher and put the fire out. When City of Madison Fire Department Ladder Company 2 arrived on scene, firefighters determined that the fire was caused by an older, recalled dehumidifier that malfunctioned. There were no injuries. *Source: City of Madison Fire Department* 

A single fire sprinkler kept a fire from spreading at the recently opened Sports Bar & Grille in Fond du Lac early in the morning on Monday, August 25. A fire in a bucket caused by rags that spontaneously combusted activated a fire sprinkler.

## **NEVER PLUG A HEATER INTO A POWER STRIP**

You may have seen this circulating around Social Media, but we wanted to ensure you stay safe this winter. The weather is getting colder, and people are pulling out their space heaters. We just wanted to remind you that you should NEVER plug a heater into a power strip. These units are not designed to handle the high current flow needed for a space heater and can overheat or even catch fire due to the added energy flow.

The Electrical Safety Foundation International says heating equipment is the second leading cause of home fires in the U.S. with more than 65,000 fires being attributed to them each year. The ESFI reports the fire result in hundreds of deaths, thousands of injuries and millions of dollars in property damage.

The ceremony will now be held the second Saturday of October as part of the WSFM Final Alarm Ceremony. This will replace the memorial service at the opening ceremonies of the PFFW Biennial Convention. The purpose of this change is to help the opening of convention be more upbeat and more about the convention itself, and to more appropriately pay honor to those who have passed, and their loved ones.

One way we plan to improve this ceremony is to align our ceremony with the schedule of the IAFF Memorial and the National Memorial. Those who have passed in 2018 and 2019 will be memorialized in 2020. From there we will then memorialize those who pass in 2020, at the 2021 memorial. This helps in making sure that we accurately and properly remember our fallen and retirees without mistakes.

From now on, a PFFW Flag in a flag box will be presented to those families who suffered a

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Line of Duty Death. Members lost in Active Duty status will receive a bouquet of flowers, and those who passed that are retirees will have their names read at the ceremony. Any PFFW member who had a family member pass that was also PFFW, past or present, will be presented a plaque in memory of the PFFW family member.

## The Proper Way to Display our Nation's Colors

**THE HONOR GUARD** receives a lot of calls with questions about Flag protocols, how to hang the American Flag between two aerials/ladder trucks, etc. So we decided to make this article about the proper ways to display our nations colors.

The United States Flag code is a guideline for all non-military citizens to go by to ensure proper homage is paid to our nation's Flag. Although, Federally, there are no real penalties for improper use or desecration of the Flag, state and local authorities are given some leeway to make penalties for such acts.

Let's start by talking about how to properly display Old Glory on a flag pole. Raising the flag should be done briskly, yet lowered ceremoniously.

If flown 24 hours a day, the flag should be illuminated at night. If not, then raise the flag at sunrise and lower at sunset. Should the flag need to be flown at half-staff, etiquette states it shall be risen to full staff, allow for a brief pause, then continue to lower ceremoniously to half-staff. At sunset, the flag should again be risen to full staff, pause, then ceremoniously lowered all the way. Anytime a raising and lowering of multiple flags occurs, the American Flag should be raised first and lowered last. This includes all International events held on American soil. When multiple flags are being flown from individual poles, the American Flag must be flown to the furthest right at the same height or higher than all other flags, or it should be the center flag and be flown higher than all other flags.

For flags posted for ceremonies, conferences or funerals: the American Flag should have no other flag to its own right. As the audience is facing the stage, they should see the American Flag to their left with all other flags displayed, in order of size of organization, going to their right. If using multiple State Flags, they should be in order of the date of succession into the United States. The same holds true if flags are to be presented. A common question is the difference between posting and presenting of colors. When colors are posted, they are placed into a stand and left there throughout the ceremony at hand. Presenting the colors occurs when the flag(s) are brought into an area for the Pledge of Allegiance or the Nation Anthem, and then marched back out.

Many people like to hang a flag on a wall or use the American Flag as a backdrop for events. If you hang a flag as a backdrop, the blue field should be to the upper right, or as the audience is facing the flag, it should be to their upper left.


